Course Description:

Special needs in today's schools. Learn how to work with children with special needs who require specialized techniques and curricula. After an overview of special education, you will explore topics such as legislation, collaboration, transition, standards, learning disabilities, emotional or behavioral disorders, AD/HD, giftedness, health impairments, intellectual disability, severe and multiple disabilities, autism, traumatic brain injury, physical disabilities, communication disorders, and visual impairments and hearing loss.

Course Learning Objectives:

- Identify your own attitudes and values regarding disability.
- Recognize the impact of societal attitudes and values toward disability on the educational system and on the individual.
- Identify the major categories or labels used to describe individuals with specific characteristics or differences.
- Recognize that categories and labels tell us very little about individuals or what they can do.
- Use an appropriate and respectful manner when speaking and writing about individuals with disabilities.
- Explain on a basic level the laws regarding the education of individuals with disabilities, including P.L. 94-142, IDEA (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act), ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act), and the professional standards for special education.
- Discuss current educational approaches regarding assessment and evaluation, placement, instruction, and curricula as they relate to individuals with disabilities.
- Recognize a person with a disability as an "exceptional individual" with special needs and unique "abilities."
