Prerequisites: None; Appropriate for advanced high school and all college students

Course Description:

Designed to provide a "persuasive edge" for academic and most other kinds of writing, this course focuses on the techniques of persuasion as well as on detecting common writing and documentation problems and learning ways to correct them. For most units, students write a short paper based in the reading assignments. Students also write a slightly longer, resource-based paper. All necessary resource materials for the assignments are available in The Language of Argument and (if the student selects the novel option for the final paper) in the critical edition of the optional novel.

Evaluation Methods:

Your final grade will be based on your performance on the following:

- 1. Written Assignments (60%)
- 2. Final Exam (40%)

Written Assignments (60%)

Written Assignments are assigned for every unit in the course. Topics will vary from unit to unit. You will be assessed on your ability to present your ideas in complete sentences, correct use of the English language, and well-developed paragraphs. The goal of the written assignments is to help you become a more effective and persuasive writer.

Final Exam (40%)

The final examination is a proctored two-hour exam consisting of short- and long-answer essay questions. The exam covers material from the entire course. You will be allowed two attempts on the exam, if you choose to take the second attempt your final score will be calculated by averaging the two attempt scores together.

Exam Method: Online without Proctoring

This course requires all students to complete exams online. Students receive two attempts on each exam. If you elect to take a second attempt, the average score of both exams will be recorded.
