

## U350-201: Intermediate Composition: The Essay, Inspiration, Order, and Insight

**Course Format:** Online

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**Course credits:** 3

**Prerequisites:** Completion of U350-102 Freshman Composition with a C or better or the equivalent; Appropriate for advanced high school and all college students.

**Course Description:** You will be writing expository essays leading to a final project. In writing the essays, you are encouraged to begin with inspiration—with an idea you care about—and then to structure your thoughts in ways that present that idea clearly to your audience.

### Course Learning Objectives

- Produce essays of varying types (e.g., classification, comparison/contrast, argument, etc.) that apply appropriate characteristics of the particular essay type to develop a limited subject and reveal or explain something new about it.
- Produce a longer paper that uses secondary sources to research a topic and provide convincing discussion and support for the paper's thesis.
- Apply standard essay format consisting of a title, an introduction, a thesis statement, supporting body paragraphs, and a conclusion.
- Employ specified composition skills (the "mechanics" of writing).
- Use appropriate paraphrase, quotation, and MLA/APA documentation of sources that contribute to the research paper.
- Use various pre- and post-writing strategies (brainstorming, outlining, and revision) to generate, narrow, organize, and improve the essays and research paper.
- Select transitions and phrasing/word choices so as to provide connection, coherence, and clarity within the essays and research paper.

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**Evaluation Methods**

Your final grade will be based on your performance on the following:

1. Written Assignments (60%)
2. Final Exam (40%)

*Written Assignments (60%)*

Each unit concludes with a written assignment. Your work should be free of errors, and formatted according to the directions given.

The overall weight breakdown for the written assignments is as follows:

- Written Assignment 1 (3%)
- Written Assignments 2 through 8 (41%)
- Written Assignment 9 (16%)

*Final Exam (40%)*

The final examination is a proctored two-hour examination that will include writing a 400- to 500-word essay. The final examination is worth 40% of your course grade.

**Exam Method: Online without Proctoring**

This course requires all students to complete exams online. Students receive two attempts on each exam. If you elect to take a second attempt, the average score of both exams will be recorded.
